GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS 2026

The following rules and regulations apply to all sections in this Prize Book. Additional rules and regulations applicable to a specific category are noted as required elsewhere in this book.

Closing Date For Adult Entry Forms

The closing date for entry forms is **September 24, 2026, by 12:00pm**. This date will be strictly enforced. **NOTE: No entry form required for youth.**

Exhibitor Entry Fee

Adult exhibitors are required to pay a \$5.00 exhibitor fee. This money must accompany your entry form unless it has already been corrected from the previous year's prize money, if you entered. The fee must be payable to the Huntsville and District Agricultural Society (cash only). **Youth exhibitors exhibit free of charge.**

Exhibitor Tags

Tags for adult exhibitors are to be completed and printed by the fair office, not by the exhibitor. Youth are to complete their own tags (see next page).

Judging

Please note that the Huntsville and District Agricultural Society hires only qualified and accredited judges. These judges do not sit on our board of directors, nor do they exhibit at our fair.

Payment of Prize Money

Payment of prize money will be cash for prize money under \$30.00 (prize money over \$30.00 will be paid out by cheque), and can be picked up at the Fair Office. Youth prize money is available Saturday and Sunday in the Ken and Violet Earl Exhibition Building during fair open hours. Exhibitors who do not receive their prize money the Sunday of the Huntsville Fall Fair should apply in writing to the Treasurer on or before October 20, 2026. **NOTE: After October 20, 2026, uncollected prize money will be considered forfeited, and the proceeds will be returned to the fair to support fair operations.**

Protests

Protests, if any, shall be made in writing to the Secretary within 7 days of the close of the Fair and shall be accompanied by a deposit of ten dollars which shall be deemed forfeit if the protest is not sustained by the Board of Directors. Any member found guilty of willfully violating any by-law or regulation of this Society shall be liable for forfeiture of all prizes won, and loss of membership in the Society for a period at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Photographs - Crowd Release

Huntsville and District Agricultural Society members will be photographing various events during Huntsville Fall Fair. The images captured may be used by Huntsville Fall Fair for record-keeping, advertising, and promotion of Huntsville Fall Fair. By entering a competition at Huntsville Fall Fair, you consent to the use of your photograph solely by Huntsville and District Agricultural Society.

YOUTH EXHIBITOR RULES AND REGULATIONS 2026

The following rules and regulations apply to the youth sections in this Prize Book. Additional rules and regulations applicable to a specific category are noted as required elsewhere in this book.

Age

Youth are **FREE** to enter in ALL CATERGORIES up until the age of 18 (in school). You may enter any category for your age/grade and ABOVE, but NOT below.

Filling out Entry Tag

Youth tags will be provided to you by us at your school. If you do not receive them in advance, reach out to the fair office. You can also fill out your tags when you bring your exhibit entries. Be sure to include your contact information (for fair use only) so that you can be contacted to collect your prize money (where applicable).

Hints

- Only enter one item per category unless otherwise stated
- Follow all instructions to the letter. If in doubt contact the Fair
- Entries are to contain only what is asked for
- When entry asks for plain white paper, paper should have no lines. Extra credit will be given to those who choose to decorate. Check that decoration is allowed.
- When a category is to be named, we want what the article is: i.e. (pig, horse) and not a name for it i.e. (Sally/Joe)

Vegetables & Flowers

- Above ground vegetables should have only a 2 inch stem (5 cm)
- Onions are not to be peeled and have minimum 2 inch (5 cm) stem
- Carrots and potatoes, not to be washed, just dusted
- Ripe vegetables are to show no green
- Green vegetables are to show no color other than green
- Vegetables should be all the same size and type in one category
- Remove all dead or dying flowers from your entries. Be sure to leave no buds.
- Oasis can be used for flower arrangements or designs

Payment of Prize Money

Prize money will be paid by cash and can be picked up either at the Fair Office or at the Ken & Violet Earl Building Friday to Sunday of the Huntsville Fall Fair. Exhibitors who do not receive their prize money the Sunday of the Huntsville Fall Fair should apply in writing to the Treasurer on or before October 20, 2026. **NOTE: Uncollected youth prize money will be delivered to respective schools where possible, for them to disperse to student prize winners.**

- All vegetables should be properly cleaned for display. May be washed.
- Beets, carrots, parsnips tops should be trimmed between 1/2" to 1 1/2".
- Celery should be cleaned and roots trimmed off
- Tomatoes and pepper stems left on
- Corn, 1/2" to 3/4" stem should be left on

- Prizes 1st \$6; 2nd \$4; 3rd \$3
- 1 lb = 500 grams
- Previous year honey crop may be shown in the honey classes
- All honey samples with more than 18% moisture content will be downgraded
- Only those samples with proper density are eligible for 1st prize
- See OAAS specials for honey classes

Syrup

- Prizes 1st \$7; 2nd \$5; 3rd \$4; 4th \$3
- Syrup will be judged on the following basis (total 90 points): 20 points for density; 45 points for flavour; 10 points for colour; 15 points for clarity
- Consisting of four classes: Golden delicate, Amber, Dark, Very Dark
- All exhibits should be in 1 jar, 250 ml or equivalent

- **Design Arrangements** Prize Money: 1st \$5; 2nd \$4; 3rd \$3
- Exhibitors must supply their own containers in all sections. Containers do not influence the judge but should be clean
- Only the variety asked for is judged
- All flowers must be grown by exhibitor, unless specified
- Judging is by Ontario Horticultural judging standards
- Clean all stems of leaves if underwater
- Judges have the right to withhold awards if in their opinion the entry is not worthy of a prize

- AV means "any variety" in the species called for
- AOV means "any other variety" other than the ones listed already in their own specific category
- Flowers or vegetables in design arrangements do not have to be grown by exhibitor, accessories allowed

HINT: Cut gladiolus stem approx. 15" from last floret. If gladiolus colour not showing, de-tip.

Section 5 - Baking

Additional Rules

- Baking Prize Money 1st \$6; 2nd \$5; 3rd \$4, unless otherwise indicated below
- Loafs and full pies should be in clear plastic bags with a tie
- Smaller baking should be in clear Ziploc type bags
- DO NOT use saran wrap
- Judges are accredited and do not enter exhibits at this Fair
- It is essential that only the number of items that are called for be entered
- Squares should be cut approx. 1 1/2" x 1 1/2". No outside edges
- Bars should be cut approx. 1 1/2" x 1". No outside edges
- Cookies should be approx. 2 to 2 1/2" round

HINT: The difference between "rolls" and "buns" - rolls are single with unbroken crusts, buns are joined together and pulled apart for tasting

HINT: The difference between "frosting" and "icing" - frostings are boiled or cooked, icings should not be cooked and have a butter or shortening base

HINT: When using new aluminum pie plates, bake the empty plate first at 450 degrees for 8-10 minutes

- The winner chosen from the "Tarts, butter, with raisins" category will be asked to prepare and present 5 butter tarts on a paper plate to compete at the District competition in October of that year. The winner of the District competition will move on to the Provincial competition held in February of the following year. OAAS rules will govern the entry.
